




### **Overview of** studies conducted in our network in 2024

# Q-CROC COPS

In parallel with our network of member hospitals, sub-networks of researchers have developed over the years. Our Communities of Practice (CoPs) constitute an effective model for strengthening communication among leading researchers in Quebec and simplifying the referral of participants to clinical trials between different centers.

"As a physician and leader of the melanoma community of practice, I have seen firsthand the significant benefits such a platform can bring. One concrete example is the increase in clinical research referrals. By bringing together experts, researchers, and healthcare professionals from various backgrounds, we have established a close-knit collaborative network that encourages patient recruitment for clinical studies. Sharing our experiences and observations allows for better identification of eligible candidates for clinical trials.

Regular exchanges during our meetings and seminars have helped many clinicians better understand patient selection criteria for specific research. This has also strengthened patient confidence in clinical trials, a crucial aspect since we know these studies are essential for advancing melanoma treatments. #### **Awareness and Participation:** Keys to Advancing in the Fight Against Cancer

Clinical trials lead to significant medical breakthroughs and are a crucial step in improving cancer treatments. However, low awareness and certain misconceptions are barriers to participation. While approximately 60,000 Quebecers are diagnosed with cancer each year, less than 5% of them participate in a clinical trial, even though thousands more could potentially be eligible.

One of Q-CROC's strategies is to collaborate closely with patient associations. To date, several hundred people affected by cancer across the province have participated in our various joint educational activities, thereby helping to raise public awareness about the importance of clinical research.


More than 40 of them display their studies on OncoQuébec or direct cancer patients and professionals to the platform as a reliable resource on their website.





## A promising new partnership

The Canadian Cancer Society (CCS) and the Quebec - Clinical Research Organization in Cancer (Q-CROC) have joined forces to establish a unified, patient-first, bilingual program to improve access to clinical trials for all Canadians.

This innovative program aims to connect cancer patients with research teams by leveraging an innovative technology solution and patient-friendly, plain language content that will make it easier to find, understand and access clinical trials.

CCS is a recognized leader in Canada for credible and accessible cancer information, and Q-CROC has pioneered a comprehensive 360-degree platform that is ready to be expanded nationwide. Our collaborative vision, in partnership with other organizations, seeks to create an agile and sustainable solution that will advance and promote innovation in cancer care. # EQUITABLE ACCESS

Ensuring that all patients, regardless of gender, age, or place of residence, have equitable access to clinical trials is a core commitment for us. Here are some examples of our positive impact:



#### OncoQuébec

Our platform attracts visitors from all over Quebec (and beyond). About 50% of our users are from outside Montreal and Quebec City. So far in 2024, the majority of our visitors have been between the ages of 25 and 55, with women making up 63% of the audience compared to 37% men.



Since 2022, we have addressed requests for support across more than 30 different types of cancer. Approximately 70% of the requests to our support service come from outside Montreal and Quebec City, highlighting our reach and the trust placed in our services by diverse communities.




#### Communities of Practice

An impressive 40% of our participants comes from regions outside Montreal and Quebec City. These participants are spread across more than 15 different hospitals, from Sherbrooke and Saguenay to the Îlesde-la-Madeleine.

# Professional Training

Since 2019, we have successfully trained over 3,600 healthcare professionals, thereby enhancing their expertise in clinical research.

The program is designed for researchers developing their own clinical trial in oncology, as well as for their team. It includes a 6-hour interactive remote coaching session with a world-class GXP consultant.



Training provided as part of the Annual Congress of the Quebec Association of **Oncology Nurses** 

Each year, representatives from Health Canada directly present new regulations, guidelines, and other relevant topics related to clinical research. A Q&A session is included, allowing participants to interact and clarify their doubts.

The webinars attract between 100 and 300 participants, and over 95% of participants consistently rate them as "very useful for my work."



#### Twice a year, sessions offer 10 to 12 one-hour interactive online courses, led by seasoned professionals from the network, aimed at young professionals.
